When we started out so boldly at Il Ciocco in the Spring of 1988, with the blessings of NATO and a determination to convince people that the humanities and sciences could work together to each other's advantage, the world was full of skeptics. Most art historians and archaeologists believed in the existence of an impenetrable barrier, that the jargon of scientists could never be understood. And many scientists had to learn that the methods of the "soft sciences" where style, tradition and history and perhaps also the mysterious 'gut feelings' could play a valid role in solving problems. The success of ASMOSIA in establishing a firm contact between the two communities can only be described as astounding. Our success can be measured by the fact that ASMOSIA is now a widespread recognizable and respected acronym with conservators, archaeologists, art historians and archaeological scientists. The outlook for the future is indeed bright; at meetings now, such as the Archaeological Institute of America, papers with scientific themes are freely mixed in the program with the purely "humanities" papers.
